3 Treasurer's Report for the year ended 31 December 2004

2004 was another good year for the Institute, with strong performances in all segments of the Institute's activities, and whilst the operational surplus of £70,462 (before one-off building repair costs totalling £113,832) was some way short of the 2003 record it was significantly ahead of the budgeted figure. This represents a further improvement in the fortunes of the Institute through sound financial planning, strong management/leadership and much dedicated hard work by the Staff, Trustees and those members who both organized and supported the Scientific Meetings, Events and Publications.

The surplus of the last two years has enabled the complete funding of essential roof repairs and external decoration of the building (costing £113,832), plus the funding of some key capital projects, notably new computer software/systems, without diluting the Institute's "free reserves", which now stand at almost £400K, well in line with the agreed reserves policy.


Conferences and Scientific Meetings results were influenced adversely by some meetings that had been planned for 2004 moving into 2005 and by there being no UKRO Congress in 2004. The Institute's share of the UKRC surplus also declined in 2004 in line with the ROC agreement, but there was a one off benefit from correctly reporting a proportion of the fees for 2005 UKRC organization in the 2004 accounts, and overall there was a strong result despite a relatively inexperienced Conference team.

Publications showed better than expected results owing to sponsorship of BJR Special Issues and lower overall costs, as did Room Hire, which provided additional funding to help maintain the building.

As expected the overall direct employment costs increased as the staff shortages of 2003 were partly addressed but it will take until 2005 for a full employment position to be realised and hence for all new staff to become fully productive. The 2004 result is hence a great achievement given the resources expended.

Mention should be made of the preparation and presentation of the accounts to be fully in line with the Charities Commission Statement of Recommended Practice – SORP – it is hoped that this will show greater transparency in the way in which funds are received and spent in pursuance of the Institute's objectives as outlined in the Trustees' Report.

As well as thanking the Institute's Staff for their commitment and dedication in achieving these results I would like to thank our new auditors - haysmacintyre - for their sound advice, help and support of the Finance Team at the BIR and their enthusiasm towards the Institute's activities that will we hope help deliver a strong result in 2005.

4 Trustees' Report for the year ended 31 December 2004

The Trustees present the annual report and financial statements for the British Institute of Radiology for the year ended 31 December 2004 prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) 2000.

INTRODUCTION

The Trustees consist of the Officers and Ordinary Council members (elected by the membership) and Branch Representatives (elected locally). Council is composed of the Trustees and observers in the form of Committee Chairmen and representatives from the SCOR, IPEM and RCR. The General Secretary attends Officer meetings and Council meetings, with input from departmental managers as required.

The aim of the Trustees' Report is to provide a review of the Institute's activities during 2004. The previous Report commented on changes in the Institute's senior management team during 2003 together with development of the BIR's activities and a successful financial outcome.

We are pleased to report that in 2004, under the Presidency of Professor Janet Husband (2003/2004) and subsequently Mr Günter Dombrowe (2004/2006), the Institute continued to make good progress across the organization, with successful publishing and meetings programmes and productive Scientific Committees. The Trustees are very grateful to the Staff, led by General Secretary Dr Tim Hogan, for their hard work and professional support.

The office systems that underpin the Institute's work were modernized, with computer systems upgraded and a new membership and events management system purchased. Visitors can now take advantage of the wireless network available in the BIR's meeting rooms.

The Institute again made a healthy operational surplus for the year of £70,462 (before one-off building repair costs totalling £113,832). The Institute also developed a new image and logo to reflect its modern outlook, and this now appears in the current literature and new website developed by Marketing Manager Mr Adrian Laws.

The Trustees reviewed and affirmed the core aims of the Institute, as expressed in the following statements:

COMMITTEES AND VOLUNTEERS

Once more the Institute's Committee structure has provided vital scientific and financial contributions to the Institute. The Committees are the lifeblood of the Institute, supporting and developing its aims and objectives, including the unique multidisciplinary nature of the organization.

Several new Committees were created in 2004 to develop the Institute's activities and to foster good governance and management: IHE-UK Committee, Molecular Imaging Committee, Audit Committee, HR Committee, Marketing Committee, Awards and Prizes Committee.

The Institute is extremely grateful to the many members and other individuals who assist the BIR on a voluntary basis on a wide range of activities – refereeing BJR submissions, speaking at scientific meetings and helping in the Library, to give just a few examples.

BRANCHES

The Institute currently has four very successful Branches – North of England, Wessex, Welsh and South West - which organize scientific meetings and social events in their regions.

The Trustees would like to ensure that all members across the UK have the opportunity to participate in activities in their own region, and the Institute is planning to develop new Branches whilst also seeking to strengthen the role of existing Branches. The Conference and Events Committee hopes to run meetings in association with the Branches, some of which may be repeats of meetings that have previously been run successfully in London.

The Institute is very grateful for the donation of £2,000 to the New Horizons Appeal from the Welsh Branch in 2004.

PROFESSIONAL ADVISORS

The Charity Commissioners require that the Trustees seek appropriate advice in the course of carrying out their activities. Our thanks go to haysmacintyre (auditors); Aurora (pensions and benefit advisors); MIA (insurance brokers); Blake Laphorn Linnell (legal advisors); and Barclays Bank.

STATEMENT OF TRUSTEES' RESPONSIBILITIES IN RESPECT OF THE ACCOUNTS

Law applicable to charities in England and Wales requires the Trustees to prepare accounts for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the Institute's financial activities during the year and of its financial position at the end of the year. In preparing those accounts the Trustees are required to:

- Select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently
- Make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent
- State whether applicable accounting standards and statements of recommended practice have been followed, subject to any departures disclosed and explained in the accounts
- Prepare the accounts on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the Institute will continue in business.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the Institute and which enable it to ensure that the accounts comply with the applicable law and regulations. The Trustees are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the Institute and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention of fraud and other irregularities.

ACCOUNTS AND FINANCIAL REVIEW

The Annual General Meeting on 19 May 2004 approved the appointment of haysmacintyre as the Auditors for 2004 and thanked Ernst & Young for their services in previous years.

The Auditors' Report is given on page 9, and the Statement of Financial Activities for the year ended 31 December 2004 is given on page 10.

The Trustees in November 2003 agreed a budget for 2004 showing a net operational surplus of £28,183. The actual operational surplus was £70,462, and this together with expenditure of £113,832 on roof repairs and external decoration of the building yielded a value for net outgoing resources for the year of £43,370.

Publishing and conferencing continued to make important contributions to the Institute's turnover in 2004, notably from institutional sales of the British Journal of Radiology and from UKRC and the Institute's scientific meetings programme.

RISK STATEMENT

The Trustees have identified risks to which the organization is exposed and have sought to ensure that appropriate controls have been put in place to avoid or minimize these risks.

RESERVES POLICY

The Institute's "free reserves" stood at £398K as at 31 December 2004. The Trustees are of the opinion that the Institute requires £250K to meet its operational needs, based on an assessment of the Institute's risks. Since this amount is well below the free reserves level, the Trustees are of the opinion that the reserves policy is adequate to meet the Institute's needs at the present time.

PUBLICATIONS

In October 2004, Dr Fergus Gleeson succeeded Dr David MacVicar as Honorary Editor (Medical) and Dr Philip Dendy continued as Honorary Editor (Scientific). In September 2004, Publications Manager Miss Louise Chantler was succeeded by Ms Sherry Dixon. The Department was effectively one member of staff under strength during the year, to be rectified early in 2005.

The Institute congratulates the BJR award winners for 2004: Barclay Medal – Dr Sameh Morcos; Barclay Prize – Dr John Kotre; Röntgen Prize – Professor Peter Williams and Team (further details of Awards and Prizes on pages 20 to 21).

Four special issues of the British Journal of Radiology were published during 2004, all of which received corporate sponsorship: Angiogenesis Imaging (Guest Editor, Dr Anwar Padhani) and Molecular Imaging (Guest Editor, Dr Andy Dzik-Durasz), both in the 2003 volume, and Multislice CT (Guest Editors, Dr Sameh Morcos and Professor Jamie Weir) and Image Processing (Guest Editor, Professor Alan Jackson), both in the 2004 volume.

A key development for BJR was the introduction of the online submission and peer review system at www.editorialmanager.com/bjr. All BIR Members have access to BJR Online and are encouraged to undertake the simple online registration process to access the online journal via <http://bjr.birjournals.org>.

The journal *Imaging* now has a new focus, offering coverage of all the major aspects of clinical radiology over a 3.5-year cycle and will concentrate on those topics that are most relevant to everyday practice, with particular emphasis on recent developments and difficult areas. All BIR members can access Imaging Online via <http://imaging.birjournals.org>.

The BIR entered its second year of publishing the journal *Dentomaxillofacial Radiology* on behalf of the International Association of Dentomaxillofacial Radiology, and this is available to IADMFR members and non-member subscribers via <http://dmfr.birjournals.org/>.

CONFERENCES & SCIENTIFIC MEETINGS

The Institute's scientific meetings programme is coordinated by the Conference and Events Committee, chaired by Mr Peter Sharpe, and the in house team is managed by Conference and Events Manager Mrs Sarah McLellan.

The BIR's Scientific Meetings programme was once again a tremendous success with 22 meetings held during 2004. The majority of the meetings were held at the BIR's purpose built Lecture Theatre at 36 Portland Place. On 26 February 2004, the BIR was pleased to be able to re-run its highly successful Multislice CT meeting at Manchester Royal Infirmary. The Institute is grateful to the many companies who exhibited at its meetings in 2004.

Professor Husband's President's Conference "Cancer Imaging of the Pelvis" was held on 19 - 20 May 2004 at the Royal Institute of British Architects, 66 Portland Place, and was videostreamed to an audience in Johannesburg, South Africa. This two day meeting included the AGM and the Annual Dinner, the latter being held at the Royal Society of Medicine. It was a great success with talks by many prestigious speakers, including the Mackenzie Davidson Memorial Lecture (Professor Rodney Reznik – "Imaging cancer of the cervix – seeing is believing"), the Silvanus Thompson Memorial Lecture (Professor Steve Webb – "IMRT: a clinical reality for cancer treatment") and the Sir Godfrey Hounsfield Lecture (Dr Anwar Padhani – "Angiogenic characteristics of cancers: tumours and treatment identifiable features"). Behind the scenes, the process of registering delegates for the BIR's scientific meetings was strengthened through the purchase of a new contacts and events management database that is integrated with the Institute's accounts software. Delegates can now register for meetings online at www.bir.org.uk/forthcoming_meetings.html.

7 Trustees' Report for the year ended 31 December 2004

The Conference and Events Department administers meetings on behalf of several other organizations, the largest and most successful being the annual UK Radiological Congress, which is run in partnership with the RCR, SCOR and IPEM. In 2004, this was held on 6 – 8 June at the Manchester G-Mex/MICC, under the Presidency of Professor Adrian Moore. This was the first time that the Congress had been held at this venue, and both the conference and the exhibition were very successful, with close to 4,000 attendees. During the Congress, Professor Paul Chang gave the BIR Kodak Mayneord Lecture on the topic "Re-engineering the Radiology practice in a digital world".

The BIR also assisted the International Cancer Imaging Society and the London CT/MRI course with their annual meetings.

The Institute gratefully acknowledges the efforts of its Conference Team, Event Management Team, Committee Members and Meeting Organizers who work hard together to maintain and develop the Institute's successful meetings and events programme.

LIBRARY & INFORMATION SERVICES

The BIR Information Centre incorporates a unique collection of journals and books on radiology and allied sciences and provides a valuable resource for BIR Members. It aims to improve access to radiological information by providing a postal, fax, telephone and email enquiry service to the UK, Europe and beyond. Many of the journals held by the Library are received as exchange subscriptions for the British Journal of Radiology.

The Institute is grateful for the financial support received from the SCOR and the RCR, whose members may also use the resource.

The BIR is the oldest radiological society in the world, and has a wonderful historical book collection and a collection of material related to the history of the Institute and to those associated with the Institute. The BIR works with other groups related to history including the Radiology History and Heritage Charitable Trust, the Contemporary Medical Archives Centre and the Science Museum in London.

In 2004 the BIR embarked on a review of the Information Centre, with the aim of formulating plans to modernize the facility and also to display more effectively its unique historical materials. This project will come to fruition during 2005.

The Institute is grateful to the Library Committee, chaired by Mr Jerry Hughes, and to Honorary Librarian Mr Bob Burns, Honorary Archivist Dr Adrian Thomas and Information Centre Manager Mrs Kate Sanders, for overseeing the Information Centre and for coordinating work on the historical books and archives.

FACILITIES MANAGEMENT AND ROOM HIRE

The Institute is proud of its home at 36 Portland Place, a grade II* listed building dating from the 1770s, which is the primary venue for its scientific meetings and Committee meetings as well as accommodating the Information Centre and providing offices for its Staff. In August and September 2004 the Institute successfully completed planned major repairs to the roof and external decoration, as per its lease obligations.

In 2004, facilities management activities at 36 Portland Place, led by Facilities Manager Mr Peter Coverdale, were successful and continued to support the maintenance of the Institute's building and contents.

FUNDRAISING AND SPONSORSHIP

Fundraising and sponsorship is essential not only to help develop the Institute but also to support its core activities. The Fundraising Committee is chaired by Honorary Secretary (Scientific) Ms Sue Marchant.

On 19 May 2004, Professor Janet Husband during her President's Conference launched the BIR's New Horizons Appeal with the aims: (i) to provide a centre of excellence in radiological education; to develop the provision of information and education to members, kindred societies, the wider medical community and the general public, through developing the Library and Information Service and website; and (iii) to raise the BIR's reserves to a level appropriate to secure its long term future.

To develop fundraising strategy the Institute commissioned a Key Issues Review from THINK Consulting Solutions, which was completed in November 2004 and provided advice on how to develop individual and corporate giving, and highlighted the need of the Institute to raise its profile and develop membership recruitment whilst bringing to the fore the multidisciplinary nature of the organization and the charitable nature of its activities. The Institute will be acting on its recommendations in 2005.

The Institute gratefully acknowledges the support it received from Members and friends throughout 2004.

GRANT POLICY

The Institute seeks to recognize the contributions of its members and other individuals to the advancement of the radiological sciences through its Awards and Prizes. These have been funded through the generosity of individuals (see Note 16 for the status of these restricted funds) and companies, which the Institute gratefully acknowledges. Individuals may either apply for awards or are nominated by members, depending on the conditions pertaining to the particular award. Many of the Institute's Committees are directly involved in the selection process, with Council making the final decision.

The highest honour the Institute can convey is Honorary Membership. Honorary Members are elected by the membership and are distinguished persons who have contributed by original research to the scientific advancement of radiology, radioactivity and allied sciences, or who have rendered services for which the Institute desires to confer honour. The BIR was delighted to present Honorary Membership to Professor Hedi Hricak and Dr Don McIntosh at its AGM on 19 May 2004.

In 2004 the Institute formed an Awards and Prizes Committee, chaired by the President, to review and develop the awards, including possible consolidation, timings and selection processes. The Institute congratulates all its Prize winners in 2004, listed on pages 20 to 21. Full listings are available on the website at www.bir.org.uk/awards.html and www.bir.org.uk/lectures.html.

LINKS WITH OTHER BODIES

The Institute continues to maintain and develop links with kindred learned societies and professional colleges in furtherance of its multidisciplinary aims, and provides professional services to a number of related organizations.

The BIR in partnership with the SCOR, IPEM and RCR owns the UKRC and UKRO Congresses, run under the umbrella of ROC (Radiology and Oncology Congresses, a registered charity) and ROCME (ROC Meetings and Exhibitions Limited).

The BIR is a member of the European Association of Radiology, the International Society of Radiology and the International Committee of the Society for Radiological Protection, and has representatives on the L H Gray Memorial Trust, the Mayneord Phillips Memorial Trust, the Radiological Research Trust and the Radiological History and Heritage Charitable Trust. The Institute has a joint European Committee with the Royal College of Radiologists and also has representatives on several RCR committees. To support its publishing and conferencing activities, the Institute is a member of the Association of Learned and Professional Society Publishers and the Association of British Professional Conference Organizers, respectively. The Institute also has representatives from the RCR, SCOR and IPEM on its Council and on several of its own scientific committees.

FUTURE PLANS

Mr Günter Dombrowe outlined the key objectives for his Presidency (2004/2006) in his Inaugural Speech on 23 September 2004: to broaden the membership of the Institute; to develop the Branch network; to ensure the financial and organizational health of the Institute; to maintain the BIR's building 36 Portland Place; to increase the public profile of the Institute; and to modernize the Library.

Mr Dombrowe also announced that the first day of his President's Conference on 25 – 26 May 2005 would be devoted to the development of CT and the achievements of Sir Godfrey Hounsfield, an Honorary Member and long-standing supporter of the BIR, who sadly had died on 12 August 2004.

Council on 25 November 2004 approved a strategic business plan and budget for 2005 consistent with the President's vision, the Institute's strategic objectives and risk analysis, and the development of its many and varied activities.

CONCLUSIONS

The British Institute of Radiology continues as a unique multidisciplinary forum for all professions in the radiological sciences, excelling in its primary role to foster education and research, and act as a resource to the radiological community. The BIR will face many challenges over the next few years with continued changes in the healthcare delivery in the UK. The Institute will adapt and modernize to ensure that it will serve effectively its current and future members throughout the world.



12 Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 December 2004

1. Accounting Policies

Accounting Convention

The accounts are prepared under the historical cost convention and comply with the 'Statement of Recommended Practice' (The 'SORP') issued by the Charities Commission in October 2000.

The accounts do not include a statement of cash flow as the Institute is entitled to an exemption under FRS1.

Depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are written off over the period of their expected lives on a straight line basis as follows:

Leasehold premises	-	over period of lease
Furniture and equipment	-	4-10 years

Stock

Stock is valued at the lower of cost or net realisable value.

Membership Subscriptions and Conferences and Scientific Meetings

Membership subscriptions and conference and scientific meetings income are accounted for on a receivable basis.

Publications

Publications income is accounted for in the period to which the publications relate.

Room Hire, Rent and Service Charge

Room hire, rent and service charges are all accounted for on a receivable basis.

Support Costs

Support costs are allocated to each activity of the Institute using a combination of direct staff numbers, and space used by each activity.

Management and Administration

These costs relate to the running of the Administration Office including all costs associated with the governance of the Society. No apportionment has been made of management and administration costs to direct charitable expenditure. Committee and Sub-Committee expenses not directly in support of charitable activities have also been included under this heading.

Pension Contributions

The Institute contributes to a *defined contribution Personal Pension Scheme* for certain of its employees. Contributions are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

Grants

Grants are charged to the SOFA in the period in which the awards are approved.

Fund Accounting

General unrestricted funds comprise accumulated surpluses and deficits on general funds. They are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general charitable objectives.

Restricted income funds are created when donations are made for a particular area or purpose, the use of which is restricted to that area or purpose. Expenditure is charged to the Statement of Financial Activities.

20 Awards and Scholarships for 2004

The Barclay Medal and the Barclay Prize

Founded in 1852 in memory of Dr Alfred Ernest Barclay, who by his will bequeathed to the Institute a legacy for the general purposes of the British Journal of Radiology. The Barclay Medal is awarded annually to the person, whether a Member of the Institute or not, whose contribution to The British Journal of Radiology over a period of years has been of special merit, contributing materially to the science and practice of radiology. The Barclay Prize is awarded annually to a Member, or a team of workers including a Member, whose contribution to the Journal has been of special merit. The subject of the contribution must have been diagnostic radiology, which includes the clinical or experimental aspects, or physics relating thereto.

The Barclay Prize was awarded to Dr C J Kotre in 2004.

The Barclay Medal was awarded to Dr S Morcos in 2004.

The Röntgen Prize

Founded in 1924, in memory of Professor W C Röntgen, this prize is awarded annually to a Member, or a team of workers including a Member, whose contribution to the British Journal of Radiology has been of special merit. The subject of the contribution must be related to radiotherapy, radiobiology or physics.

The Röntgen Prize was awarded to Professor P Williams and team in 2004.

The Silvanus Thompson Memorial Lecture

Founded in 1918 in memory of Professor Silvanus P Thompson, the first President of the Röntgen Society, this lecture has since 1940 been delivered by a non-medical lecturer. The lecture is given at the annual President's Conference.

The 2004 lecture was given by Professor S Webb.

The Mackenzie Davidson Memorial Lecture

Founded in 1920 in memory of Sir James Mackenzie Davidson, a pioneer in British radiology, nominations are sought for this lecture and has since 1940 generally been delivered by a medical lecturer. The lecture is given at the annual President's Conference.

The 2004 lecture was given by Professor R Reznik.

The Kodak Mayneord Memorial Lecture

Founded in 1984 in memory of Professor V M Mayneord, CBE, FRS, Past President and Honorary Member of the BIR, this lecture is generously sponsored by Kodak. The lecture is given at the annual congress.

The 2004 lecture was given by Professor P Chang.

The Sir Godfrey Hounsfield Lecture

Established in 1997 in honour of Sir Godfrey Hounsfield and his pioneering work in computed tomography, this lecture is generously endowed by Dr Marion Frank OBE. Applications are invited from BIR Members of any age and discipline and the lecture carries a stipend of £1000. The subject of the lecture should be an account of a major recent advance in radiology and its allied sciences and it is given at the annual President's Conference.

The Stanley Melville Award

Founded in memory of Dr Stanley Melville, this award of £1000 is intended to enable a Member to visit an Institution or Clinic abroad.

The 2004 award was made to Dr J Howells.

The Nic McNally Prize for Cancer Research

The BIR Nic McNally Prize for Cancer Research was established from the monies raised by the friends, colleagues and BIR staff in memory of Dr Nic McNally. Dr McNally was a long serving Honorary Editor of the BJR and President Elect of the BIR before his untimely death in 1991. This £500 prize takes the form of a bursary for travel either to a scientific meeting or to another laboratory and is awarded for original work in cancer research. Applications are welcomed from all young scientists under 35 years of age in a scientific post, including both Members and non-Members.

The 2004 prize was awarded to Mr G Hayes.

21 Awards and Scholarships for 2004

The Flude Memorial Prize

The Flude Memorial Prize was established in 1992 by Mr Royston Flude, a Member of the Institute, in memory of his late father, Arthur Charles Edwin Flude. A cheque for £500 is awarded to a Member who has conducted research that has significantly advanced the science and practice of radiology.

No award was made in 2004.

The Amersham Health Fellowship

This Fellowship was founded in 1999 and is generously funded by GE Healthcare. It provides £5000 to enable a Radiographer, Scientist or Radiologist with an interest in the use and application of pharmaceuticals in diagnostic imaging, to visit one or more centres abroad. Areas of interest would include new techniques involving contrast enhancement in X-ray, MRI or ultrasound or new developments in pharmaceuticals.

The 2004 Fellowship was awarded to Dr T C See.

The Amersham Health Prize

This prize is sponsored by Amersham plc who offer £100 for the best proffered paper on a Nuclear Medicine topic by any delegate to the Annual Congress.

The 2004 Prize was awarded to Dr S Babu

The Clinical MRI Prize

This prize was established and funded by Professor Paul Goddard, Director of Clinical Press Ltd, to promote the study and dissemination of magnetic resonance imaging. A cheque for £50 and a commemorative statuette are awarded for the best proffered paper on MRI by a BIR Member at the annual congress. There is no age limit but preference is given to Members early in their career.

No award was made in 2004.

The Leonard Levy Memorial Prize

This prize was established in 1992 by Mr Bennett-Levy and Levy Hill Laboratories, in memory of the late Dr Leonard Levy. A cheque for £125 is awarded to the BIR Member under 40 years of age, judged to have submitted the best proffered paper or poster at the annual congress.

No award was made in 2004.

The Welsh BIR/Bracco Fellowship

A Travelling Fellowship worth £1000 has been established by the Welsh Branch of the BIR in association with Bracco UK Ltd and is equally funded by Bracco and the Branch. The purpose of the Fellowship is research or further study in Radiology, which would benefit Radiology in Wales. Application is invited from Radiographers, Medical Physicists and Radiologists who are BIR Members and who work in a hospital in Wales. The Fellowship is biennial and the next award will be made in 2006.

The 2004 Fellowship was awarded to Dr P Fielding.

The Philips Nuclear Medicine Travel Fellowship

Generously funded by Philips Medical Systems, this award is intended to sponsor a visit to one or more centres abroad, or to attend a major conference where other funding for this is not available. The Travel Fellowship is aimed at people working in any of the disciplines within Nuclear Medicine. Preference is given to BIR Members.
