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
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Obituary: Fred Musaph

August 12, 1917 to November 25, 2007

On November 25, 2007 those of us who have long been members of the IADMFR lost a fellow campaigner for the advancement of dental maxillofacial radiology, and more importantly, a friend.



Fred Musaph was born on August 12, 1917

in Amsterdam, The Netherlands. He studied in Amsterdam, but he entered dental school at Tufts University, Boston, USA, graduating in 1951 with his DMD. He moved from Boston to Lloydminster, Saskatchewan, Canada to work in the government children's dental program from 1951 to 1952, and also entered private practice there in 1952. It was in Lloydminster where Fred met Pat, whom he married in 1957, just down the road in Battleford, Saskatchewan. He and Pat remained in Lloydminster until 1958 then moved to Invermere, British Columbia, where Fred was in private practice. In 1962 Fred relocated to Vancouver, British Columbia, to join the Shaughnessy Hospital and worked in the dental department for seven years. Fred then taught at the University of British Columbia from 1969 to 1975. Ever the wanderer, Fred and Pat moved to Hyrylä, Finland, where Fred joined Palomex to work on their Orthopantomograph. In May 1982 Pat travelled ahead to Golden, British Columbia to oversee the construction of their retirement home. Fred joined her in August of that year.

Fred was known to many of us because of his interest in oral and maxillofacial radiology. He was a founding member of the Canadian Academy of Oral Radiology (now the Canadian Academy of Oral and Maxillofacial Radiology). It was fitting that it was in 1973, in Vancouver, that the Canadian Dental Association recognized radiology as a dental specialty. Fred was also

active in the IADMFR. It was at the second meeting, in Erlangen, that I met Fred, although we had corresponded. He and I, together with two other members, one from South Africa and one from The Netherlands "hung around together" at the meeting. Our conversations moved from English to Dutch to Afrikaans to German and back, without any of us missing a beat. It was truly an international association. Fred once confessed to me that whereas he spoke many languages, Finnish was the one that defeated even him. And I know that Fred tried. Apparently he was recently studying Mandarin. In the 1980s Fred was elected as a Director of the IADMFR, representing Canada. He took the job seriously and was as active in promoting the Association as he always was in everything he did.

His Worship, James Doyle, the Mayor of Golden, he told me that Fred was liked by all. I was not surprised. He was involved as a volunteer senior citizens councillor, and was always on the go, riding around on his power scooter. Fred never was much of a man to sit around and do nothing. Pat told me that he was always on the computer, keeping in touch with a wide circle of friends and colleagues, and because of this, he taught computer classes. He was also a member of the Historical Society. In our letter exchanges, when our son Jason was younger, Fred frequently sent interesting pictures - usually of animals, wild and domestic - that he thought Jason would like. We shall miss him. Fred died just two weeks to the day, shy of his 50th wedding anniversary.

Fred is survived by his wife, Pat, and five daughters, 8 grandchildren and 3 7/9 (according to Pat) great grandchildren; along with two sisters, a cousin,

one niece and four nephews. He was predeceased by his son and brother.

Pat said, "Fred meant many things to many people; to us he meant everything."

Dear colleagues,

The organizing committee is working hard to finalize the plans for the scientific and social programme. The final programme will become available online in October 2008 on our congress website (www.iadmfr2009.org). As we are living nowadays in the



digital era, we will exchange information in a digital format. We do not intend to send out printed second announcements. All information on the pre-congress, congress, social programs, hotel reservations and registration is available online.

The subject of the pre-congress course on Sunday 28th June 2009 will be ConebeamCT imaging where attention will be paid to the latest technological features, dose and dosimetry and of course clinical applications. We also expect interest in this course from implantologists, orthodontists and oral surgeons who often adopt new diagnostic tools more quickly than we do.

As already mentioned in the first announcement, the theme for the 17th ICDMFR will be "Imaging in Perspective". Currently we are experiencing numerous changes and developments in maxillofacial radiology. The theme of the conference will offer many opportunities to focus on various aspects of new imaging modalities, as well as, the role of maxillofacial radiologists in dentistry and medicine and on new teaching methods, which are especially helpful in our field, to mention just a few "perspectives".



Editor's Report

Thanks to all of the contributors, both authors and reviewers, *Dentomaxillofacial Radiology* continues to thrive. About one year ago we implemented use of the Editorial Manager system for manuscript submission and review. While a few people have experienced some computer difficulties with the system, I think most have found that it makes the whole process more efficient. I know that the time I spend as editor has been significantly reduced due to using the system.

In 2007 we went from six issues/year to eight issues/year, due to the increased number of submissions and the increased wait time from acceptance to publication. Even though we have decreased our acceptance rate for manuscripts, we still have more than an adequate supply of good quality papers to fill all the issues. We are trying to move away from case reports, although we will still accept some that show particularly significant lesions or unusual presentations, and more toward research papers. We will also publish occasional other types of papers that may be of interest to our readers.

In 2007 we also changed the cover of DMFR to make it look a little more contemporary, with new type style and a new image. While many members commented positively on the new cover design, some also criticized the occlusal image used as not being adequately representative of the scope of dentomaxillofacial radiology practice. For 2008 we have selected three new images, two cone-beam CT views in different planes and different reconstruction algorithms, plus an axial



MRI image. I would like to thank everyone who submitted an image for consideration for the cover and particularly the three people who submitted the "winning" images: Drs. Dale Miles (sagittal CBCT), Min-Suk Heo (MRI), and Allan Farman (coronal CBCT).

Over the next year I expect to make some changes in the International Editorial Board so that others may have an opportunity to participate. We will plan to have a Board meeting at the 2009 Congress in Amsterdam, but of course Board members (and all IADMFR members) are welcome to send in suggestions at any time for the improvement of the journal.

DMFR will also undergo a major transition in the next few years when I step down from the editorship and turn the journal over to someone else. When I was appointed editor by the Board of Directors, it was for a 6-year term, to end in 2009. At the Congress in Beijing last year I was asked if I would consider staying on for another two years. Assuming that the Board does not change its mind, I will remain editor until 2011, but then it will be time for someone else to take over because I will be fully retired from my university position by then.

I would be happy to talk with anyone who might like to serve as editor in the future, giving my perspective on the time and energy commitment required (a lot!), as well as the benefits and gratification of working with and for our organization. There are also opportunities to try out the editorship by acting as an associate editor for a while. The three current associated editors, Jackie Brown, Curtis Chen and Andre Mol have taken on the responsibility of handling some of the manuscripts submitted to the journal, selecting reviewers and making decisions.

I look forward to continuing to work with you on the journal.

The BSDMFR was

founded in 1958. Thus, this will be a Golden Anniversary meeting not to be missed.

Invited speakers include Bob Langlais (USA), Sharon Brooks (USA), Reinhilde Jacobs (Belgium), Kostas Tsiklakis (Greece), Lennart Flygare (Sweden), Keith Horner (UK), Ian Francis (UK) and Mark McGurk (UK). The subjects covered will include cross sectional imaging, CBCT - including selection criteria, minimally invasive salivary gland techniques, and imaging of vascular abnormalities, TMJ, bone disorders, and facial pain patients.

The conference accommodations is located at the Rembrandt Hotel, just a short walk from the Natural History Museum. A list of other hotels in Kensington will be posted on the website shortly. There are a number of local

attractions in and around Kensington for delegates and their accompanying persons to enjoy. Adjacent to the Natural History Museum is the prestigious Science Museum and the splendid Victoria and Albert Museum. For those who like a spot of shopping, Harrods is tantalisingly close together with the other up-market shops on Kensington High Street. Just a stone throw away is Kensington Palace, Hyde Park, Buckingham Palace and Chelsea where, if you have the stamina, there is more shopping, eating places and some famous pubs.

Another important event to be noted is the PEF-IADR meeting in London, 10- 12 September. PEF stands for Pan European Federation merging different European divisions, to ensure a critical mass of researchers to ensure focused and appropriately themed sessions and build successful European networks. Regarding research collaboration, there is an ongoing European project, denoted SEDENTEXCT: Safety and Efficacy of a New and Emerging Dental X-ray Modality. In 2007, the European Commission released its first calls under its new Seventh Framework Programme of the European Atomic

Energy Community (Euratom) for nuclear research and training activities (http://cordis.europa.eu/fp7/euratom). Within this was a specific opening for a research proposal relating to "Safety and Efficacy of Medical Uses of Radiation".

A consortium of European Academy members recognised that this was a timely opportunity for a proposal to address the issues surrounding CBCT. Colleagues at the University of Manchester (UK) acting as Coordinator and, in strictly alphabetical order, the National and Kapodistrian University of Athens (Greece), the "Iuliu Hatieganu" University of Medicine and Pharmacy in Cluj-Napoca (Romania), Leeds Test Objects Ltd. (UK), Katholieke Universiteit Leuven (Belgium), Malmö University (Sweden) and Vilnius University (Lithuania) developed a project proposal during late 2006/early 2007. The proposal was highly rated by the referees and, after the usual negotiation phase, the contract with the European Commission was signed as 2007 drew to a close. The project duration is 42 months (start date 1st January 2007) and the EC contribution is €2.45 million.

The aim of the project is the acquisition of key information necessary for sound and scientifically based clinical use of CBCT. In order that safety and efficacy are assured and enhanced in the 'real world', the parallel aim is to use the information to develop evidence-based guidelines dealing with justification, optimisation and referral criteria and to provide a means of dissemination and training for users of CBCT. Among its anticipated output will be a marketable QA Test object. Further details are available on the project website (currently in embryonic form) at www.sedentexct.

Report fom North America by Jie Yang and William C. Scarfe IADMFR North American Directors

This report is submitted as a review of the important professional activities and developments related to dento-maxillofacial radiology (DMFR) in North America since our last Report.



Dr. Laurie Carter (Virginia Commonwealth Univ.) current president of the AAOMR (2007-2008)

The Executive committee of the American Academy of Oral and Maxillofacial Radiology (AAOMR) consists of Dr. Laurie Carter (President)(Fig. 1), Dr. James Geist (Immediate past President), Dr. Michael K. Shrout (Executive Director) and Drs. Christos Angelopoulos, Madhu K. Nair, Charles F. Hildebolt and Don Tyndall (Councilors). Dr. Allan G. Farman was elected to the office of President-elect (2007-09) and will assume the position of President for a 2 year period in November 2009 at the Annual Session to be held in Louisville, Kentucky. Dr. Scarfe continues to serve as

Treasurer and Dr. Farman as Editor of the Oral Radiology Section of Oral Surgery Oral Pathology Oral Medicine Oral Radiology and Endodontics (OOOOE), the official publication of the AAOMR. Most recently the editor has appointed two associate editors for image guided treatment (Drs. Charles Hildebolt and William C. Scarfe).

The advocacy role of the AAOMR at the political level has been actively advanced by the Executive and the American Board of OMR with recent conversations between Dr. Anthony Ziebert, the new Director of The Commission on Dental Accreditation (CODA) of the American Dental Association (ADA). As a fledgling recognized specialty of the American

Dental Association (ADA) with less than 200 Board certified OMFRs, participation in these activities increases the profile of the Academy, and Oral and Maxillofacial Radiology in general. Other national input from AAOMR has been to the The ADA Council on Scientific Affairs commenting on the recent updated report entitled "Dental Management of Patients Receiving Oral Bisphosphonate Therapy — Expert Panel Recommendations"

The AAOMR acknowledges the life and outstanding contributions of three AAOMR members who have recently passed away: Dr. Guy Poyton (Distinguished Life Member, Diplomate of Honor, ABOMR), Dr. Arnol Neely (Active Member and Diplomate, ABOMR). Dr. Coleman Reed Tuckson (Active Life Member, Fellow and Past President of AAOMR and a Life Diplomate of the ABOMR).

The DICOM WG 22 (Dentistry) continues to be Co-Chaired by Dr. Allan G. Farman (University of Louisville) and John Goyette (Schick Technology, NY). This group has much common membership with American Dental Association Standards Committee on Dental Informatics WG 12.1 (Interoperability) for which the same Co-Chairs. For DICOM WG 22, the American Dental Association (Sharon Stanford) acts as Secretariat.

ADA WG. 12.1 has been the leading group in SCDI subcommittee 12, with most other WG 12 activities held in conjunction with this WG. WG 12.1 acts in conjunction with WG 12.4 for DICOM issues involving visible light and with WG 11.6 for DICOM and digital radiography issues related to Orthodontics.

The DICOM WG 22 generally meets four times each year with meetings in association with the ADA SCDI twice a year and at least two additional two-day meetings at the ADA HQ in Chicago. One or both WG 22 Co-Chairs also meet 2-3 times per year with the DICOM Standards Committee and/or DICOM WG 6 (DICOM Base Standard), the secretariat for which is

the National Electrical Manufacturers Association. Activities to extend the DICOM Standard through Supplements or Correction Packages are under the hat of DICOM WG 22. Activities to explain DICOM and interoperability via Technical Reports and educational displays are under the auspices of ADA SCDI WG 12.1.

Concerning the DICOM Standard per se, Supplement 113 (e-mail transport) and 116 (3D X-Ray) are now part of the standard and had inputs from DICOM WG 22 (Dentistry). Supplement 123 (Structured Display) is ready for final reading by DICOM WG 6 and is anticipated to be sent out for Public Review by the end of this month. This supplement was originally designed for transfer of full mouth X-ray formats, but now also includes use cases from ophthalmology, cardiology and radiographic teaching cases. WG 22 has been invited by DICOM WG 11 to be part of the DICOM implant standard. The originators of this draft supplement are from Orthopedics.

ADA SCDI WG 12.1 is approaching completion of TRs on DICOM for the larger dental practice/clinic/hospital and also on the use of DICOM e-mail transport in Dentistry. Final texts are anticipated for the SCDI in March 2008. Continued work is in process regarding TRs on cephalometric standardization (WG 12.1/!!.6 conjoint activity), interstate image transfer (only 18 state Boards of dentistry are on record of accepting the reading of radiographs out of state), and an overview of interoperability concerns for digital imaging in dentistry. A new ADA TR proposal will be made for description of 3D X-Ray interoperability.

Educational efforts by WG 12.1 have involved interaction with ADA Annual Sessions. In 2007 we did not make a DICOM CD, but rather demonstrated DICOM interoperability directly using the DICOM CT standard in conjunction with live patient demonstrations with four cone beam CT systems during ADA Annual Session in San Francisco, CA. The acquired images were shown to be interoperable by importation into various software products working

with DICOM objects, the DICOM tags were displayed and image sets were exported via secure .ftp for a virtual and physical model production and for dental implant planning. Image fusion was also effected between 3D photographic and cone beam CT datasets. The outcomes of these activities were described in a January 2008 issue of "Inside Dentistry" and in the February 2008 editorial for "Oral Surgery, Oral Medicine, Oral Pathology, Oral Radiology and Endodontology." There will be a special issue of JADA in June 2008 concerning digital radiology and of course DICOM/interoperability will be included. A specific WG 12.1/DICOM/interoperability booth is planned for ADA 2008 in San Antonio.

The 58th Annual Session of AAOMR was held at The Knickerbocker Hotel. Chicago, Illinois, November 28 - December 2, 2007. Dr. Christos Angelopoulos, Chair of the Annual Sessions committee, developed an outstanding program. "Special invitation" CE programs were be presented by Dr. Hugh Curtin, MD of the Harvard Medical School, Chief of Radiology, Massachusetts Eye and Ear Infirmary on "Head and Neck Anatomy 101", Drs. Ahmed Gharib, MD and Dima Hammoud, MD from the National Institutes of Health, Clinical Research Center on "An Introduction to Molecular Imaging" And Professor Dirk Schulze, DMD, MD, PhD from the Head and Neck Diagnostic Section, Department of Oral & Maxillofacial Surgery, University Freiburg, Germany on "C-arm based Imaging and Navigation in Cranio-Maxillo-Facial Surgery. In addition a full day Workshop open to all dentists and professionals was presented on the Saturday entitled "An Evidence-Based Approach To Cone-Beam CT Use In Oral & Maxillofacial Radiological Diagnosis" (Fig. 2). This featured structured presentations from prominent clinicians on the clinical efficacy of CBCT imaging for various diagnostic purposes. The social program, as usual, was excellent and provided academic and social interchange in a collegial atmosphere (Fig. 2-5).


